Our Mission, Vision, and History

Mission

Through the state's official tall ship, the Oyster Schooner *A. J. Meerwald*, and the historic waterfront museum, the Bayshore Center at Bivalve (BCB) will advance the understanding of the human impact on New Jersey's aquatic environment through education, advocacy, and programming.



Vision

BCB envisions a New Jersey with clean, safe and healthy water for recreation, consumption, and commercial fishing.

About

BCB, "Where History and the Environment Meet," was founded in 1988. It is an organization focused on using local history featured in our Delaware Bay Museum, combined with hands-on learning aboard our floating classroom, the 1928 Oyster Schooner *A. J. Meerwald*. The organization is housed in the historic 1904 oyster shipping sheds and wharves located in Port Norris (Bivalve), NJ.

BCB was founded by Meghan Wren and John Gandy to save *A. J. Meerwald*, a Delaware Bay Oyster Schooner. In 1996, *A. J. Meerwald* was listed on the National/State Register of Historic Places. She was given the title by Gov. Whitman as the Official Tall Ship of New Jersey in 1998, but without funding.

What started out as a grassroots effort, BCB has grown into a professional staff of 10 including a well-respected and proficient Museum Curator and a ship's Captain, in addition to a seasonal crew. The organization is a proud ambassador of New Jersey's maritime history both on land and sea.

Where We Work

The Bayshore Center at Bivalve works with schools and organizations throughout the tristate area of New Jersey, Delaware, and Pennsylvania. The majority of youth educational programs come from Cumberland, Cape May, and Atlantic counties.

Oyster Schooner *A. J. Meerwald*

In 2025 *A. J. Meerwald* visited and delivered programming in **11 ports**. (Bivalve, NJ; Trenton, NJ; Norfolk, VA; Cape May, NJ; Toms River, NJ; Atlantic Highlands, NJ; Jersey City, NJ; Philadelphia, PA; Baltimore, MD; St. Michaels, MD; and Chestertown, MD.)

A. J. Meerwald participated in **HarborFest** (Norfolk, VA), the **Great Chesapeake Bay Schooner Race** (placing 4th of 6 in our class), **Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum's OysterFest**, and **Sultana Downrigging Festival**, as well as offering public, education, and family education sails.



- **3,392 passengers sailed aboard *A. J. Meerwald* on “Public Sails” in 2025**, experiencing her history, connection with local waterways and the environment, and her ongoing support of the oyster industry.
- *A. J. Meerwald* offered **133 public and specialty sails** over **87 sailing days**.
- **2,175 people visited *A. J. Meerwald*** for education programs and deck tours.
- **440 total passengers (students & chaperones) participated in Education Sails** (Sailing Field Trips). When sailing from our home port at the Bayshore Center in Port Norris, NJ, students participate in three land based interactive educational stations in the museum and then climb aboard *A. J. Meerwald* to meet our crew, hoist the sails, and participate in three hands-on education stations while underway.
- **348 passengers sailed on public Family Environmental Education Sails**, offered in Liberty State Park, Cape May, and Trenton. Liberty State Park Education Sails were offered for free to New Jersey residents through our partnership with Liberty State Park.

The vessel was brought into compliance with new Subchapter T requirements and can now carry overnight passengers. We welcomed overnight passengers aboard for a charter program with Cape May Point Arts and Science Center on our transit from Bivalve to Trenton, and hosted a group of Sea Scouts during the Sultana Downrigging Festival.

Additional boat updates include new bunk mattresses in the foc'sle and aft cabin, a new house battery bank, and adding an additional freshwater tank to increase capacity by 50 gallons.

Two capital improvement projects are currently underway thanks to the support of our donors and the New Jersey Historic Trust. The first is a project to increase maneuverability of the vessel by examining the propeller, transmission and engine. This project will be completed in the spring of 2026 with the installation of a new 40" custom propeller. The second is the replacement of the original Keel, which was identified as needing replacement in the fall 2025 USCG inspection. This project will begin in the late fall of 2026 at Mystic Seaport.

The Delaware Bay Museum

The Delaware Bay Museum had 3,177 visitors engaging in museum tours, education programs, and community-based events.

Of the 3,177 visitors, **250 were unique visitors** who came to specifically tour the museum. This does not include the many individuals who attended educational programs or community events. This year BCB strategically opened the museum on Wednesdays & Saturdays from 11 AM

- 4 PM May through October without the support of the cafe and docks being opened to the public. This allowed the organization to focus staff resources on museum visitors and exhibits.



While BCB has been a leader in youth education for nearly 30 years, our work as stewards and as a repository of Bayshore Region history, has caught the attention of academics and higher education institutions. Professors brought their students from NJ and PA colleges and universities and invited BCB to participate in initiatives.

Museum Series:

- The **Spring Series** featured oyster films about the Delaware, Chesapeake and Barnegat bays and included *White Gold*, *A Passion for Oysters* and *The Oyster Farmers*.
- The **Summer Series** included short films on South Jersey Pine Barren traditions, shipwright Tim Clark's original presentation on the 2021-22 restoration of the *A. J. Meerwald*, and intern Claire's presentation *From the Archives*.
- The **Fall Series** saw the films: *A Meeting of Migration*, *UNFILTERED the Truth about Oysters*, and *Empire Oyster* shorts. Art presenters consisted of talks about Port Norris photographer Sam Cobb, photographers of the Delaware Bay, and Lenni Lenape art and traditions.

Exhibit Update


The *L. Albertson (Al) Huber Maritime Traditions of the Delaware Bay* exhibit and dedication of the **Huber Maritime Education Room** opened Second Friday on June 13th. Al was an early BCB supporter and trustee whose collection of artifacts formed the basis of our museum, now in its 32nd year. Meghan Wren and Michael Chiarappa shared stories and recollections. Al's children Trudi Hathaway and Joe Huber, and family attended.




Monuments to Migration & Labor Project:

BCB is a proud partner of Dr. Andy Urban, of Rutgers New Brunswick Mellon Foundation, who funded the *New Jersey Monuments to Migration and Labor (NJMMML)* project that uses the arts to explore the immigrant and migrant experience. BCB is one of nine partners statewide. Dr. Linda McBride and Dr. Cadmus Hull (children of African American migrant oyster workers) served as the facilitators for the community dialogue session held in June.

In November, BCB hosted *Flagship: Monument on the Move*, the first of three events that NJMMML Monument Artist, Immanuel Oni, is organizing in the South Jersey project region. The event focused on exploring the migration histories of African Americans who came to Port Norris from the Chesapeake. These community-building activities are the basis for Oni's artistic process and will inform the mobile monument installation that he is designing.



The digital children's book *Growing Up on the Shellpile*, commissioned by the NJ Monuments to Migration and Labor project, was completed in late December featuring the voice talents of Port Norris children, Trayden Olin Doughty and Lantana Hope Doughty. The digital book was written and produced by Keith Wasserman of Shoot the Moon Communications.



Donations to the Museum & Collections:

- Rutgers Shellfish Research Laboratory - three wire oyster baskets.
- Elizabeth "Lisa" Otremsky - Steamer trunk and clothing belonging to Augustus J. Meerwald (senior) and family. Of particular significance is the shipping tag on the trunk "AUGUSTUS MEERWALD Planter and Wholesale Dealer in Maurice River Cove Oysters Dennisville, N.J." This is the only known printed material with the name Augustus Meerwald.
- Michael Harper, estate of Joan Riggin Harper – split oak woven oyster basket, *Man, the Sea and Industry* book and *Undersail the Dredgeboats of the Delaware Bay* book.

Museum Leadership

In April, BCB hosted the League of Historical Societies spring meeting. Speakers included Barney Hollinger on The State of the Oyster Industry, the NJ Cultural Trust, and the Preservation Center for Arts & Historic Artifacts on emergency planning and climate change. BCB attended the NJ Preservation Conference and NJ History Conference. In September, BCB hosted the NJ Association of Museums workshop on mold prevention, detection and mitigation.

Education

- **5,120 total youth participated in educational programming** offered all season from the Delaware Bay Museum, and dockside in additional ports. One area of growth in 2025 was the ability to provide education and outreach at events and away port visits. This year partnerships were built with NJ Parks and Recreation, youth sailing organizations, maritime museums and local non-profits. Your support helped make this impact possible.
- **1,344 youth engaged in land-based educational programming** with visits to the Museum, and dockside programming offered at Barnegat Bay, Trenton, and Liberty State Park with partnerships with AmeriCorp, Sea Scouts, United Mercer Interfaith Organization (UMIO), Tulpehaking Nature Center, and SPLASH Classroom.
- A variety of adult-programs on land and in the museum along with usage by outside organizations reached **2,726 individuals**.
- BCB also hosted museum colleagues from around the state during the League of Historical Societies spring meeting, and a NJ Association of Museums workshop led by the Conservation Center for Arts & Historic Artifacts.

BCB hosted tours for **85 college students** (including undergraduate, masters and PhD candidates) **and community groups** from University of Pennsylvania, Temple University, Rowan College of South Jersey, Rutgers University Haskin Shellfish Research Laboratory, the American Littoral Society, ReClam the Bay, and Richard Somers Chapter of Questers.



Financial Review

The annual operating budget was just shy of \$1M with increases in revenue in fundraisers and giving. Grants remained consistent from 2024. Program revenue was down due to refunds for significant weather cancellations. Expenses remained consistent with 2024 with additional expenses for education staff, interns and support. The year ended with a surplus.

Overall, the organization is in good financial standing with proven operational models in every area of the budget. BCB uses accrual accounting. The 2024 Form 990 is posted and the 2024 audit was completed by Tracey and Tracey Certified Public Accountants.


Grants

BCB had a very successful year in grant support. Two grants were awarded in 2025, with funds deposited in 2026 totaling \$360K. The 2025 Keel Replacement project, awarded by the NJ Historic Trust, will begin in the fall of 2026 requiring \$164K matching funds to be raised in 2026.

- Cumberland County Cultural and Heritage NJ State Council on the Arts Block Grant
- NJ Historic Trust - Replace section of A. J. Meerwald's keel. (Project scheduled for fall of 2026)
- NJ Cultural Trust - Stabilization grant to create a cash reserve.
- NJ Arts and Culture Fund - General Operating Support (GOS) Grant
- Commercial Township Green Team - Roadway/ Shoreline Clean-up
- Monuments to Migration - Project Grant
- NJ Historical Commission - GOS
- NJ Historic Trust - Covid Relief Grant. This special grant program is available to Trust funded capital projects (A. J. Meerwald restoration) that can demonstrate a cost overrun because of increased construction costs. Funds will only cover the overage relative to the original scope of work from 2021 grants.




2025 Revenue
